


Refugees make a positive contribution to country?





How much better or worse do you think refugees have made or would make the following in the area where you live? (% Worse)



Global attitudes towards refugees

Malaysians are opposed to accepting refugees into the country. Attitude towards refugees has become less positive globally and in Malaysia since 2022.

Many Malaysians view refugees as economic opportunists who do not contribute to the nation's development. Additionally, over half of the population associates refugees with increased crime, infectious diseases, and lack of cleanliness in their communities.

Public opinion on government policies towards refugees varies widely across the world. While countries such as New Zealand, Canada, Spain, and Brazil are open to accepting more refugees, those in Asia, particularly Southeast Asia, are willing to allow those who are already present to stay, but not any additional refugees.

Turkish and Malaysian populations have expressed the strongest opinions, with over half of them wanting to deport current refugees and not accepting any more. These countries do not see any compelling reason to take in more refugees, whether its humanitarian, legal, or economic reasons.
