


How 2019 Conservatives voted in 2024

Amongst 2019 Conservative voters who voted in 2024, just over half continued to vote for the party, with a quarter backing Reform, and one in five switching to either Labour or the Liberal Democrats.





What are the most important reasons why you chose to vote for this party/candidate in this General Election?



Which reasons helped you to decide your vote? *By 2019 Conservative switchers*


What are the most important reasons why you chose to vote for this party/candidate in this General Election?





Healthcare and the NHS, the cost of living and the economy were the most important issues for voters. Conservative loyalists were also motivated by taxation, pensions and defence


Which, if any, issues were very important to you in helping you decide which party to vote for?
