

Rock the Vote / USA Today

Millennial Survey

These are findings from an Ipsos poll conducted March 3-10, 2016 on behalf of USA Today. For the survey, a sample of 1,541 adults age 18-34 from the continental U.S., Alaska and Hawaii was interviewed online in English. This sample included boosts of African Americans (N=197), Hispanic/Latino Americans (N=243) and Asian Americans (N=173)

The sample for this study was randomly drawn from Ipsos's online panel (see link below for more info on "Access Panels and Recruitment"), partner online panel sources, and "river" sampling (see link below for more info on the Ipsos "Ampario Overview" sample method) and does not rely on a population frame in the traditional sense. Ipsos uses fixed sample targets, unique to each study, in drawing sample. After a sample has been obtained from the Ipsos panel, Ipsos calibrates respondent characteristics to be representative of the U.S. Population using standard procedures such as raking-ratio adjustments. The source of these population targets is U.S. Census 2015 American Community Survey data. The sample drawn for this study reflects fixed sample targets on demographics. Post-hoc weights were made to the population characteristics on gender, age, region, race/ethnicity and income.

Statistical margins of error are not applicable to online polls. All sample surveys and polls may be subject to other sources of error, including, but not limited to coverage error and measurement error. Where figures do not sum to 100, this is due to the effects of rounding. The precision of Ipsos online polls is measured using a credibility interval. In this case, the poll has a credibility interval of plus or minus 3.1 percentage points for all respondents (see link below for more info on Ipsos online polling "Credibility Intervals"). Ipsos calculates a design effect (DEFF) for each study based on the variation of the weights, following the formula of Kish (1965). This study had a credibility interval adjusted for design effect of the following (n=1,541, DEFF=1.5, adjusted Confidence Interval=4.6).

"W1" references the first wave of the USA Today/Rock the Vote/Ipsos Survey in January 2016. "W2" is the current survey data.
